communications to report a problem or a suspicious occurrence in a neighborhood. And always it means being there to lend a hand, whatever the problem.



- ✓ Play your favorite records for one hour.
- ✓ Read for two hours by a 60-watt light bulb.
- ✓ Stay snug under an electric blanket for two hours.

- ✓ Run programs on your home computer for one hour.
- ✓ Ease pain for four hours with a heating pad.
- ✓ Shave with an electric razor for one month.
- ✓ Tape TV programs for three hours on your VCR.
- ✓ Listen to the radio for two hours.
- ✓ Fry food in an electric pan for 10 minutes.
